WASHINGTON, D.C., June 23, 2025 - GEUS has earned the American Public Power Association's Safety Award of Excellence for safe operating practices in 2024. The utility earned the Diamond Award.

More than 200 utilities entered the annual Safety Awards for 2024. The entrants are placed in accordance with their number of worker-hours and ranked based on the most incident-free records and overall state of their safety programs and culture during 2024. The incidence rate is based on the number of work-related reportable injuries or illnesses and the number of worker-hours during 2024, as defined by the Occupational Safety and Health Administration (OSHA).

In 1891, GEUS became the first municipally owned electric utility in Texas. More than a century later, in 2001, it also became the state's first municipally owned cable television and high-speed Internet operation. GEUS provides these services to over 30,000 consumer-owners in Greenville, Texas, about 50 miles east of Dallas. One of the unique aspects of GEUS is that it is governed by an autonomous board of trustees appointed by the Greenville City Council.
